Sears, Roebucks & Co Fall Winter 1931-32

Sometimes simple is the best. This elegant looking dessert is simply lime gelatin mixed with fresh pineapple, as instructed in a 1931 Royal Gelatin advertisement.

Lime and Pineapple Cup

Dissolve 1 package Royal Quick Setting gelatin (lime flavor) in 1 cup boiling water.

Add 1 cup cold water. Pour into shallow pan and chill. When firm, cut into small cubes.

Arrange 2 cups fresh pineapple, cubed and sweetened, with cubes of gelatin in glasses and serve as fruit cup

Brands We Still Know

Royal Gelatin was introduced in 1925 by the Royal Baking Powder Company. Later in 1929. the company, along with the Fleischmann company and others, merged to become Standard Brands Incorporated. Royal Gelatin was marketed as a direct competitor to Jell-O Brand gelatin. Although new on the market, the company used the popularity of its other products to convince consumers to try it. It was promoted as superior to its competitor due to its use of fresh fruits for the flavoring instead of the artificial flavoring sometimes used by Jell-O.

This show made history in 1937 when Vallee insisted that Louis Armstrong be hired as the show's host during Vallee's summer vacation, making Armstrong the first black American to host a major network program.

Rebuilding Original Ammeters

If you have a original ammeter that needs repair here are a few tips that might help you.

Take it all apart like in the picture, do not remove the needle. Be very careful of the needle, it will bend very easily like aluminum foil. If the pivot point on the needle is rusty soak it in evaporust, thick heavy rust will need to soak from 3 to 5 days.

Oil the pivot point after the rust is removed. After everything is clean, you need to polish the brass where the terminals contact it with steel wool and put some dielectric grease on it to prevent corrosion in the future.

There are some red fiber washers in the pictures, most of the time there will not be any fiber washers present when you take it apart, so you will need to make some. Spin some fiber washers in a drill or lathe and file or sand them until they will fit in the holes in the brass



case.

If the washers are thicker than the brass case they will not work properly, so sand them down until they are the same thickness as the brass or a couple of thousands thinner. They keep the terminal posts centered so they will not short out on the case.

When you put the magnet back in test it to see which way the needle moves when current goes through it.

When you put the ammeter in a 28-29 panel it should show a discharge when the load is connected to the terminal closest to the instrument light, if it is working backward remove the magnet and turn it over and that will reverse the direction of the needle.

I usually install a new chrome ring available from some vendors, because the tabs will usually break off if you try to use the old ring. You can touch up the black paint with a small brush if needed. The face and glass from some of the older reproduction meters will work on a original meter, I do not know if the face and glass from the meters that are currently sold will fit. The last picture shows a before picture of the same ammeter.









A few other tips shared on this forum:



To straighten out bent pointers, If it is severely bent you might have to start out using your fingers to get it close then turn it upside down on a smooth table and put something under it to hold it level, I found some nuts that were just right, then push on the pointer with a pencil eraser to make it flat. To make the pointer line up with the 0, use a toothpick and push the pointer all the way to the side then apply a little pressure to bend the pointer until it lines up with the 0. Yes you can bend it with a toothpick it is very delicate.

To improve conductivity lightly tin the bolts and the surface where they attach. Then sweat them together. This will lower the resistance and prevents corrosion from increasing resistance in the future. This generates heat and odd electrical issues that are hard to diagnose. BUT, I have to add.. doing this right is not simple. The bolts MUST be tight to the surface. If you are not experienced with soldering and knowing that you have the two parts tight then you are better off not attempting it. If the joint is not tight then at high current the solder could melt causing a poor connection. Of course, if you plan on using the repro meter you better do that before you try to use it. Seems more then one has overheated at that connection.

I found some electrical insulating material (with the help of VFF'ers) to replace the piece at the rear of the ammeter can. This piece is commonly burned up from a loose carriage bolt/screw that arc's and heats up. The insulator burns up and then the ammeter shorts out to the can. The ammeter is usually ok for restoration if no other damage has been done. The electrical insulating material I found on eBay, it's called "fish paper" and this is the same thickness as the original material.

I put the fiber washers on a #8 screw and hold them with a nut and spin them in a lathe, a drill will also work. I use a file, the first time you do it you will also need to file the nut down with the washers. I have only seen one or two ammeters that had fiber washers present when they were taken apart, I do not know if the factory put them there or if they were added during a repair. Don't forget to sand them down to the same thickness of the brass. I put them in all my ammeters.



Tony's Tech Tips


We started to solve a problem based on the wiring for the horn and found it was something else unrelated. Such fun.

What we experienced may help others to avoid a similar problem. The horn on my 1931 Four Door sounds anemic. Perhaps seriously so. Not being afraid to blunder on where I know little, I removed it to do the usual things to smarten up the sound. Before I removed it, I took out the fuse. Yes, The fuse. There is only one. I cleaned up the horn, bench tested it and put it back on the car. All good. I put the fuse back in the block making the system live. Enter flash of blue and yellow and a sound much like Zot! My fuse blew. Did it again with the same result. I began to be gun shy about further attempts. My rapid conclusion: the horn was killing my fuse. The question was how.

I called my son Geoff as he is far more knowledgeable about things electrical. We followed the Les Andrews blue manual trouble shooting chart to no avail. We disconnected the horn and, eventually the wire below the generator to isolate the problem. No joy. At this point we were lost. Geoff was playing with the fuse block and found the rear mount for the fuse was loose. Geoff suggested that the problem was in the fuse block. I knew how to address this one. Money solves many things. A phone call and the part was on its way.

On a warm November day, Geoff installed the new fuse block. No blue and yellow flash. No Zot. And the car resumed doing all the things it was supposed to do. Success. The new fuse block is a better design so the problem we experienced will not happen.

Now to the reason for this epistle. Below is a picture of the unhappy fuse block. When we removed it, the nut in the middle was loose showing about 1/8' of thread below it. We found that if we tried to install a fuse, the bolt assembly was pushed down shorting on the starter. If the nut is tight, no problem. The Message: Look at the fuse block on your car. If it is the one in the image, make sure the lower nut is tight or your future includes blue/yellow spark and Zot!

Model "A" Winter Storage Tips

As found in the "Skyliner", official newsletter of the Skyline Chapter, originally printed in the "The Chatter, Calumet A's newsletter"

Change the oil and lubricate the chassis.

Wash and wax the exterior, including the chrome.

Vacuum and wash the interior and apply a protectant such as Armor All on all vinyl, rubber and plastic parts.

Fill the fuel tank to prevent moisture from forming and rusting the tank. Add a gasoline stabilizer. Fuel spoils after 30 days (source Road & Track.com)

Make sure the battery is fully charged.

Be certain that the cooling system is filled with a sufficient amount of good-quality antifreeze to protect from rust and freezing

Spray the chassis parts that may rust with a rust inhibitor such as WD-40.

Drive the car before storage to be sure that all parts are well lubricated.

It may be desired to raise the car off the tires to prevent flat spotting, but adding about fifteen or twenty more pounds of pressure to the tires will help considerably.

Do not set the parking brake for a long period of storage, as the drums could rust and seize the shoes. The brakes could also stick from rust or moisture.

The car should be covered to prevent damage from birds, cats and bugs. If the car is to be stored inside, use a breathable cover to prevent moisture from forming and creating more problems than no cover at all. If the car is outside, of course, it must have a waterproof cover or moisture will collect and attack the chrome and body

I put a wad of steel wool loosely in the tailpipe to discourage chipmunks & mice from taking up residence in the muffler.
