



The Invoice Tells the Tale!

Just like today, the automobile dealers of Model A times had their add-on's and upcharges. Here is an original invoice for a 1928 Model A Sport Coupe. Base price is \$704, but then, check out the accessories and extras that were added on:

> Parking lights \$10 Power Lub \$1.50 Running board mats \$6 Tire locks \$1.50 Pedal pads \$1.50 Extra tire and tube \$15.50 Tire cover \$2 Trunk & rack deluxe \$65 Motometer \$6.50 Coupon Book \$12 Fender wells \$30 Spare Wheel \$7.50 Wind wings \$12.50

While some of these seem like a bargain by today's money, back then it was quite pricey! And notice how some of the luxury items seem a little heavier in price compared to the necessary stuff. The wind wings cost more than the parking lights! And the coupon book was not cheap. My best guess is that it is for dealer services such as oil changes and lube jobs. The bottom line is that by the time they included all this, the price had rocketed to \$875, an increase of over 24%!

Rattles Under the Hood

Very few things are as annoying as a persistent rattle under the hood while you drive our Model a. Of our it stops when you pull over and look under there!



That rattle is driving me CRAZYI

Here are some things that I have found over the ears can sound like a rattle under the hood:

- The radiator support rods. They come loose at the radiator or at the firewall.

- The engine pans. Just one loose bolt/nut can rattle like crazy (hard to find)

- Hood support/prop brackets. The ones that "fold in" will rattle if closed all the way. Open it back up $\frac{1}{2}$ inch to separate the halves from touching.

Brake rods. Jiggle them by hand. You may need to install some of the oversize clevis pins to tighten things back up, or replace the return/ anti-rattle springs.

- Tools and things under the seat. (I found a large screwdriver one in my side curtain pan, way in the back, that was causing a rattle that I chased for two years!)

I hope this helps you track down that annoying rattle. In a future tech tip I will cover potential sources of other annoying noises in our car.


Chuck Yeager and a Model A

SCARVES FLIRTY AND DEBONAIRE (Part 2)

For men, "scarves or mufflers were made of washable silk crepe, rayon, or wool. Sizes varied. Some found were 17"x 53." 13"x 48," and 33" squares, some with fringe. Evening scarves came in square or long and narrow styles. Some came in white brocade, some plain or patterned white silk. Monograms were popular on scarves." MAFCA Fashion Guidelines

The 1930 Christmas edition of The Observer, Gifts for Gentlemen, offered a wide selection of mufflers and reefers, however none of their offerings were labeled as scarves. In researching the term "reefer" the Meriam Webster dictionary's second definition is "a close-fitting usually double-breasted jacket or coat of thick cloth." This is definitely a new term for me. The

prices ranged from \$3.50 to \$10. In today's money. \$3.50 equals 562.42 and \$1 \$10 equals \$178.34. Clearly not an inexpensive gift.

The muffler on the left. imported and offered in an "unusual warp print design with self fringe and a wide border of rich satin." \$10

To the right is a slightly less. expensive imported silk muffler featuring an "all over brocaded swirl figure on satin ground. Wide satin border; self fringe." \$7.50





"A rich paisley design is employed in the silk pique crepe muffler with self satin jacquard figures overall." \$5



"Bright and attractive colorings in solid color self jacquard, tubular crepe reefer with heavy fringe." \$3.50

"Solid color cashmere reefers imported from Scotland; give warmth without weight. Worn Ascoted." \$5.00

Baked Bananas with Bacon

Fry bacon – while bananas are baking in their skins just as you'd bake potatoes. Bake ten to fifteen minutes, in moderate oven (375°F). Serve with one-third of skin removed and garnished with bacon.

Banana Bar-le-Duc

Spread a banana with cream cheese and dapple it with bar-le-duc (current jelly) or other jelly.

Banana Charlotte

Quarter Bananas lengthwise and arrange pieces upright in a sherbet glass to look like ladyfingers. The center is a fluff of whipped cream vanilla flavored and sweetened just a trifle, topped with a cherry or chocolate shot.

NAPA Auto Parts started in 1925, when a group of independent auto parts sellers met in Detroit to form the National Automotive Parts Association. With people increasingly relying on cars and trucks for transportation and business, they saw the need to improve the distribution of automobile parts around the country. The organization set standards for the parts they sold, and NAPA stores and warehouses, owned by member companies, quickly became known as a place to get reliable parts. The crash

of 1929 and the following depression increased the demand for repair parts as older vehicles were kept in use. Over the years, one company gradually bought out the other members, and the NAPA name became a brand.

Wheel Balance



Don't throw away those "junk" parts. They can be recycled. If you have a lathe, you can make these parts in a couple of hours.

I used the shock rod because of its hardness and toughness, but you can use 1/2" rod, or anything you have around the shop.

This is how I did it — but you may have a better idea. I purchased the bubble level at a store that sells trailer supplies. Be sure to put a guard around the level.

I used a piece of the shock that I cut apart. The rod in the shock has a 5/16" nut on the bottom, so you don't have to thread the end of the rod.



How to Re-Form Damaged Threads

Nobody wants to deal with damaged threads, but with a little prep and know-how, you can save the thread, the part, and your sanity.

Threads are a critical part of the assembly of pieces we call automobiles. The spiral-incline plane that creates a bolt, nut, or threaded hole allows for easy disassembly and generates a strong, durable clamping force. The effectiveness of threads relies on a smooth and well-fitting assembly which means any bit of corrosion or damage can be a big problem.

When-not if-some damaged threads appear on your project, there is a lot going through your head: Everything from horror stories of drills and threaded inserts to tales in which the hero was a wire brush.

In the middle of the chart of options is chasing the threads to clean them and remove damage. You might be tempted to reach for your tap-and-die kit ... but that might not be the best idea.

Method #1: Use a Tap

There is always the chance that whatever tap you have is slightly different than the one that originally cut those threads. Any differences between the two would be settled by force; a hardened tap would easily bite a chunk out of the aluminum cylinder head to declare victory.

Method #2: Buy a Thread Chaser

If you're looking at that thread chaser and thinking, "Kyle, that looks an awful lot like a tap," you're correct. It does, but a couple of key features are hiding in plain view that make a chaser different than a tap-and better for this situation. The first is right on the nose: A pilot section, which helps align the tool into the thread bore. Taps lead with a cutting edge in most cases, which means if the tap starts slightly crooked, you'll have a harder time feeling the misalignment. If you try multiple times, you will start to remove the material. Remove enough, and the chance of stripping the thread increases significantly.


Notice that, behind the pilot, the threads do not have the same lead-in as a cutting tap. Again, since a chaser is only meant to restore damaged threads, the design is just less aggressive overall. Using a chaser means less chance of swarf falling into your project, too. Just to be cautious, coat the chaser with grease to catch any debris it might loosen. A good quality set of thread chasers is under \$100 and covers a variety of pitches.

Method #3: Make Your Own 1 – 4



Making a thread chaser is not difficult, and the skill is a nice trick to have up your sleeve. Just take a grade 8 bolt and file down the first few threads to create that pilot and lead-in threads. If you are really motivated, use a hacksaw or small cutoff wheel to create a few reliefs that can collect any debris that will be forced out of the threads as it re-shapes and cleans them. Next time you are in the middle of that project and damage a set of threads, you are prepared to handle the problem the right way ... or at least understand the risks of doing it the other way.

There is a place and time for each, and having more skills and understanding of what you are doing is always a good thing. .
