How to Look Like a Model A Era Man with Very Little Effort

Your wife is all decked out in her era fashion outfit and she's looking at you like, "get with the program". What does she want? You've got on black pants and a white shirt and even put on a tie and she still isn't satisfied. Well here's where I can help....

All you need to do to make this outfit look like the Model A era is to add a few accessories. Here are a few examples that will make her think you are a fashionista of Model A era fashions.

If you are wearing trousers and a long sleeved shirt, roll up the sleeves on your shirt; add a bowtie and a straw boater. They are usually easy to find at a costume shop. You are now dressed for a summer outing.



If you are wearing black pants and a shirt, put a vest on and wear a cap.

If you are wearing a suit, a fedora (shown on the left) or a homburg (shown on the right) would be a nice touch.

Brands We Still Know

Baking Powder Biscuits

2 cups Occident Flour 4 tsp baking powder 1 tsp salt 4 Tbsp shortening 3/4 cup milk



Sift flour before measuring. Mix and sift dry ingredients thoroughly.

Cut in shortening. Add milk.

Handle as little as possible.

Pat out on a floured board 1/2 inch thick and cut.

Bake in a hot oven (about 400°F) for 15 minutes. When bake remove from pan immediately.

The Ames Company was started in Massachusetts in 1774 by blacksmith John Ames, making metal shovels. Ames shovels were used in the Revolutionary War, the War of 1912, and the California Gold Rush. It is said that Abe Lincoln picked the company to supply the shovels for the building of the Union Pacific railroad. They were also used to build the base of the Statue of Liberty and the Panama Canal. By the end of the 19th century, the company made 60% of the worlds shovels, and they were turning out 5000 per day. They

continued to be used for large jobs the world over like Mount Rushmore

and the NY subway system. Hoover Dam, Golden Gate Bridge, Empire State Building, all made with Ames shovels. The company was part of a merger in 1931, becoming the Ames Shovel and Tool Company. After several other mergers and name changes, the company became Ames True Temper in 1999. Today, they sell non-powered landscape tools.

Jim's Tech Tips Pleated Paper Fuel Filter Elements

Ford originally used a fine mesh brass screen at the top of the glass fuel strainer bowl that's mounted to the Model A firewall. The bowl gives a place for water to settle into (water is heavier than gasoline) and a place for dirt and rust particles to collect.

The screen also keeps these particles from traveling down to the carburetor (where you have another screen!). With all these screens, I think Ford knew that gasoline supplies at the time were prone to contamination (more than today).



Many people have started to install a

small pleated paper filter element in the glass bowl instead of the brass screen.

I'm not so sure it's needed; I think the brass screen is enough. The Model A has no fuel pump, it relies only on gravity feed, and I'm concerned about adding another restriction to the fuel flow.

But IF you use one of these paper filters, you need to know that the rust, dirt, etc. is trapped INSIDE the paper element, not on the outside of it like you'd think. Therefore, you can be collecting a lot junk inside the filter, plugging up the filter element on the inside, and not even know it. One day, you lose all your power and



the engine really acts like it is starving for fuel. You thought you would see the rust and dirt collect on the outside of the filter... but you don't. Surprise! (I hate surprises!)

So, if you are going to use these pleated paper filters, get into the habit of replacing them regularly, maybe once a year, since you can't see how dirty they are inside. And carry a spare filter and gasket with you in the car. It's a pretty easy thing to swap out in a parking lot. Kind of messy, but it can be done without tools. Use some disposable gloves and you won't smell like gas for the rest of the day.

That's all for now. Keep driving, help each other out, and Have a Model A Day! Jim

Model A Tools, covered in Area 17 of The Model A Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards, is a good area with which to become familiar. When you go to a swap meet, you need to know what you are looking for since there are a variety of items that look about the same but may be a Model T, Model A or V8 item or even an item that was part of a tool set from a different vehicle manufacturer. The most common tools are pliers, screw drivers and wrenches. These tools are inexpensive and often incorrect.



These adjustable wrenches look great with the forger's name and Ford Script visible on the upper one and the wonderful Ford script on the one beneath. The top one is correct while the bottom one with no forger's mark and a misplaced Ford script is probably from a Ford V-8 tool kit.

The spark plug and cylinder head wrenches were used across all the years that Ford produced vehicles. There are lots of wrenches that look great. The top two wrenches have Ford script near the spark plug end with the script facing in either direction. That must be good. Well that is not good enough. The real test is that the only correct wrench is the one on the bottom...it fits the parts on a Model A Ford.

The pliers are attractive. They both have Ford script but they are of different sizes. The one on top is forged by McKaig-Hatch and the script is in the correct location. The pliers below has a larger Ford script and is forged by Barcalo. I am not sure where it belongs.

There are lots of screwdrivers around. Model A screwdrivers can be confused with V-8 screwdrivers. The difference is in the size of the non-fluted portion. The Model A handle (bottom one) is more rounded. Also, many screwdrivers have had the blades modified or sharpened.
